

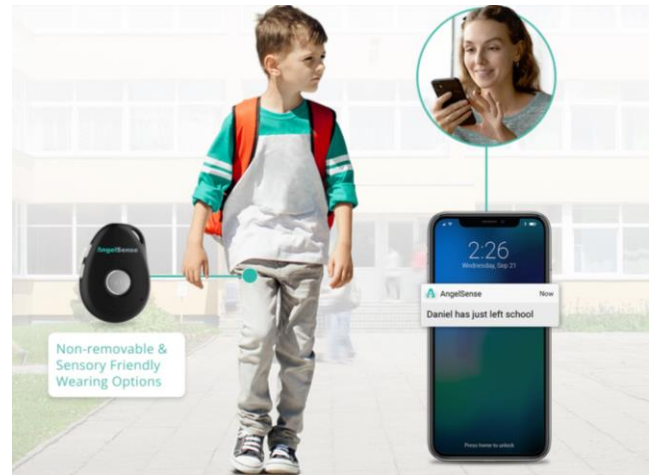

## Project Life Saver

### How Does It Work?

Clients enrolled in the Project Lifesaver Program wear, on the ankle or the wrist, a one-ounce battery operated radio transmitter that emits a unique frequency every second, 24 hours a day. When a client is reported missing by their caregiver, certified Project Lifesaver electronic search specialists can determine the location of the client by utilizing specialized search and rescue techniques and radio frequency locating equipment.

Unlike GPS technology, radio frequency can be utilized and remain effective under any circumstances, and most importantly, Project Lifesaver is more than a locating product, but rather a program headed by trained and certified professionals dedicated to protecting the special needs individuals in their community.

## Apple Air Tags

This is a great option for when families are attending events within a limited distance / range (shopping malls, community parks, concerts etc.) AirTags need to be within **about 33 feet** of an iPhone or other device in the Find My network for its Bluetooth signal to register. Apple AirTags don't have GPS. But the technology is similar. Instead of calculating a location using a network of satellites, AirTags use a network of around 1.8 billion iPhones, iPads, Apple Watches, and Macs. You can attach AirTags to clothing, add them to a backpack or use watch bands / necklaces / key chains etc.

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## Additional Strategies for Keeping Your Kids Safe

1. Add a lock at the top of the front door that your child cannot reach or add lock mechanisms to door handles. There are versions for front doors and patio doors as well.
2. Add door chimes to your front door so you can be alerted when the front door is opened.



3. Use a visual of a stop sign on the inside of the door to cue your child to stop.
4. Install **safety cameras** inside and outside your home. This will allow you to keep a watchful eye on your child if you are not in the same space in the house.
5. Provide your child with motivating activities that occupy their time especially when they may be unsupervised. This can include playing games, watching videos, or even helping around the house.
6. Use **social stories** to identify expectations around being safe and staying with family / trusted adults when at home or unfamiliar environments.
7. Provide your child with frequent praise and positive reinforcement when they stay inside the home or follow instructions to stay in a safe place.
8. Identify people like neighbors and family who agree to help you search if needed.
9. Prepare materials that include your child's name, communication abilities, ways to calm your child if she is upset, a current picture, caregiver contact information, and places your child has commonly eloped to in the past. Distribute this information to individuals in your search party as well as public authorities.
10. Teach your child to recite her name, telephone number and address, or keep this information attached to your child during times when elopement is likely to occur. You can also investigate getting identity tags / bracelets for your child. <https://www.roadid.com/>
